
Dear MECEP Friend,

September is the transition from summer to fall. As the temperatures cool, the election season is heating up. During this time, MECEP remains focused on helping Maine people and media understand the impact of policy decisions and on providing the most up to date analysis of Maine's economy. This month new data from the U.S. Census Bureau on poverty, income and health insurance revealed Maine to be an outlier among states in providing health coverage and affirmed that for most working Mainers the signs of economic recovery remain elusive.


The number of Mainers without any form of health care coverage grew by 12,000 in 2013 and the state's uninsured rate rose from 10.2% in 2012 to 11.2% in 2013, according to federal [Census Bureau data released on September 16th](#). Nationally, the rate of uninsured fell by 0.2%. Maine and New Jersey were the only states to experience an increase in the percentage of their people who do not have health insurance. Maine's decline can be attributed in part to restrictions on Medicaid eligibility enacted in the last two years and to changes in key consumer protections by the state in 2011 that have led to higher premiums for older rural Mainers and small businesses.

[MECEP's analysis](#) helped shape the coverage of this new data and garnered significant attention through social media. The [\(Lewiston\) Sun Journal](#) and [Maine Public Broadcasting Network](#) featured our work, and both [WZON-AM's The Morning Pulse program](#) and [WVOM-AM/FM's George Hale and Ric Tyler show](#) invited MECEP on for talk radio interviews.

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On September 18th, the census bureau's [American Community Survey \(ACS\)](#) reported that Maine's median household income and the percentage of Mainers living in poverty remained more or less the same from 2012 to 2013.

"The lack of improvement in median household income and overall poverty is further evidence that this recovery is leaving too many Maine working families behind," MECEP economist Joel Johnson noted in a [joint press release](#) with

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

[Maine Equal Justice Partners](#) and the [Maine Children's Alliance](#). "Maine's poverty rate remains higher than it was even in the depths of the recession, and incomes for Maine's working families are down and going nowhere. Real income for Maine's median household is lower than it was at the bottom of the Great Recession and showing no signs of growth. Income inequality continues to grow, as paychecks for wage earners are no bigger than they were a decade ago."

On a much more encouraging note, the ACS found that poverty among Maine children under 18 fell to 17.0% in 2013 from 20.4% in 2012, while poverty among children under 5 fell to 20.4% from 26.9%. While these levels are much closer to those existing before the recession, nearly one in five Maine children under the age of 5 still live in


MECEP continues to follow closely Maine's slow climb from the depths of the Great Recession. As the [Maine Job Watch](#)
