Dear MECEP Friend,

The first regular session of the 127th Maine Legislature adjourned *sine die* on July 16, 2015. (If you are not already familiar with the importance of those two words, *sine die*, to the state of our current constitutional discussion, check your favorite print, broadcast, or internet news source.) As you will see below, throughout the session, MECEP was a reliable, trusted, and valued resource to policymakers, the media, and the public. And as the summer progresses, our 2015 interns are churning out important research and information that will be invaluable to our agenda going forward.

First Session Legislative Round-up

The keystone of each legislature is the biennial budget it enacts during the first session, and advocating for a budget that invests in Maine people is one of our highest




priorities. The two-year state budget for 2015-16 just passed over Governor LePages's veto provides more tax relief for working families than any budget in ten years.

The legislature made the state's Earned Income Tax Credit refundable, meaning low-income working families can receive the full value of their income tax credit even if they have no tax liability. This will increase after-tax earnings for 100,000 working families in Maine by as much as \$9 million per year. The legislature also created a new sales tax fairness credit to alleviate the impact of sales tax increases on working families by providing \$35 million of targeted tax relief per year. Policymakers preserved \$62 million over the two-year budget cycle in municipal revenue sharing funds and expanded the homestead exemption, lowering property taxes for all Mainers. These actions provide more than \$100 million in tax relief to Maine families and will deliver lasting and meaningful change that will benefit working families for years to come.


MECEP was a key contributor to the budget negotiations, working behind the scenes to provide information that legislators need and helping to secure a budget that included unprecedented levels of targeted tax relief for low income Mainers and more funding for education, property tax relief, and local services than the governor's budget proposal. MECEP also played a lead role in calling attention to the shortcomings of an alternative tax plan put forward by legislative Republicans.






Share of Tax Cut by Income Group by Plan June 16, 2015
