

MECEP: New Data Confirm Maine Health Coverage Suffering Due to Current Policy


MECEP analysis of new census bureau data revealed that Maine, once among the leading and most successful health policy innovators nationally, is the only state where the percentage of people with health insurance coverage has not increased since passage of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) in 2010. The new data shows that Maine, which ranked 10th in the percentage of those with health coverage in 2010, dropped to 24th place in 2014.

Even more troubling, MECEP's analysis revealed that **Maine is the only state where the percentage of children under 18 without health insurance has increased significantly** since 2010 from 4% in 2010 to 6.3% in 2014. **Approximately 5,000 fewer Maine children currently have health insurance coverage than in 2010.**

"The governor's success in cutting access to health care for low-income individuals and parents in his first term and his

continued opposition to accepting federal funds to expand Medicaid make Maine an outlier when it comes to making sure that more people have access to affordable health care," Executive Director Garrett Martin said in a press release announcing MECEP's findings. "This will have lasting effects for the health of Maine people and our economy."

MECEP Urges Congress to Reauthorize Key EITC/CTC Provisions Due to Expire



If Congress lets the key provisions of the federal earned income tax (EITC) and child tax (CTC) credits expire this year, [37,000 Maine families - including 64,000 children - will lose some or all of their working family tax credits](#). The EITC and CTC promote work and assist low-income families to make ends meet. They lifted 28,000 Mainers, including 14,000 children, out of poverty annually from 2011-2013.

"Research has also found that children in families who get an income boost from the EITC and CTC quickly show improvements in health and school performance, . . . have higher school test scores, on average, and are more likely to go to college and to work and earn more as adults," the [Center on Budget and Policy Priorities reports](#).

"These tax credits reward people who work, they encourage people to invest in long-term financial security for themselves and their families, and by enabling working families to spend more to improve their skills and standard of living, these tax credits strengthen Maine's economy for all of us," MECEP and New Ventures Maine wrote in a September 7th [joint op ed for the Bangor Daily News](#)."
