Maine's minimum wage has room to grow

Trying to derail a citizen-initiated ballot question that would increase the state minimum wage to \$12 per hour by 2020, a coalition of Maine businesses cited a [University of California, Berkley study](#) to [threaten lay-offs and job losses](#), if the citizen measure passes. MECEP took a careful look at the study and found that the business group had misinterpreted its findings. Had they done the correct calculations, the coalition should be advocating a much higher minimum wage than the \$10 an hour they were asking the legislature to consider as a competing measure to the citizen initiative already [approved by the Secretary of State's office](#).

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


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Maine's Minimum Wage Has Room to Grow

Declining enrollment is not an indicator of declining poverty

The LePage Administration claims success in reforming welfare and lowering costs of public assistance when all they are really doing is adding work requirements and other hurdles that lead people to lose their benefits and slip further and further behind. As more Mainers lose TANF, SNAP, and MaineCare, [homelessness](#), [hunger](#), and [children with no health insurance](#) are all increasing in Maine. MECEP took the Administration to task for [welfare](#) and [health care](#) policies that are predicated on false assumptions and inaccurate data.

The unemployment rate doesn't tell the whole story

Again, while Governor LePage points to low unemployment numbers as a measure of his policies' success, MECEP regularly responds with its own analysis (see [here](#) and [here](#)) about how the releases on the state's unemployment rate do not account for a shrinking workforce and do not capture discouraged workers who have stopped looking because none is available. When including these discouraged workers, it is clear that Maine is still recovering from Great Recession. These more detailed numbers are now

What's in a name? Payday lenders' bill misleads lawmakers and the public

Supporters are touting an industry-backed bill, the Consumer Protection and Choice Act (H.R. 4018), presently making its way through Congress, as an effort to protect consumers when it is nothing of the sort. In reality, the bill would delay the federal consumer protection bureau's attempt to write stronger industry regulations by two years and would nullify strong state laws that are already in place. Payday lenders are not held to the same standards as commercial banks or credit unions. Their unregulated and often abusive practices trap low-income families in a cycle of debt and poverty. MECEP [called out](#) the industry on their misleading tactics and urged our Congressional Delegation to oppose this bill.



In the Legislature

MECEP remains a voice of reason in the state budgeting process and sets the bar for commentary by others. In March we [explained how Governor LePage's piece-meal budget approach is shortsighted](#). A short time later, the

editors of the [Portland Press Herald](#) echoed our assessment.

During this session, MECEP also helped protect tax fairness and future funding for shared priorities. With MECEP's data and analytic support, the legislature fended off the governor's effort to eliminate the [estate tax](#) and a [cap on itemized deductions](#) that would have primarily benefited Maine's wealthiest individuals, and they [increased state funding for local education as part of their conformity package](#).

Finally, legislators have not yet acted on a 2016 bill ([LD 633](#)) that provides yet another way for Maine to accept federal funds to expand MaineCare, but MECEP and the Cover ME Now coalition have provided support and analysis to efforts to pass this bill. [MECEP's latest analysis](#) shows how Maine's failure to accept federal funds affects different parts of the state by legislative district.
