## Annual Cost of Maine's Substance Abuse Epidemic, 2015

Rates of substance abuse and overdose have increased dramatically in recent years. In 2016, Maine legislators passed a bipartisan package of measures aimed at tackling what is regarded as a statewide crisis. LD633, "An Act to Improve the Health of Maine Citizens and the Economy of Maine by Providing Affordable Market-based Coverage Options to Low-Income Uninsured Citizens" presents another opportunity to tackle this problem by improving access to treatment for tens of thousands of Mainers. Nationwide, 44% of opioid abusers are uninsured, and lack of insurance is a significant barrier to treatment and recovery.

The costs of expanding access to insurance are a tiny fraction of the total cost of substance abuse on Maine's economy. The most comprehensive report on this topic was conducted in 2013 for the Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services using 2010 data. Where possible, the figures have been updated, using more recent data (which has, in almost every case, increased the total cost, as substance abuse has increased in Maine in recent years). All costs have been adjusted for inflation. All costs are those attributable to drug abuse alone — alcohol abuse costs have been excluded.

Taken together, the above indicate that this is likely a significant underestimate of the total annual cost in 2015.
